Individual Contributions to the Collection:

Chris Allan has learned how to catalogue using the Past Perfect Software. She has catalogued photographs on various Nashua Company's and Nashua residents.

Barbara Bankeroff fulfilled the management of the Nashua Historical Society's software, Past Perfect. Barbara has trained new Past Perfect users and she has been the computer support person to all of the Past Perfect staff. Barbara has worked on many photograph Research Requests. Barbara completed 133 catalog records of which mostly were photographs and did include other eclectic items and documents.

Mathew Bull, an intern, has learned how to accession and catalogue using Past Perfect Software. He has cataloged 597 catalog records and has catalog 181 container list catalog records. Matt's dedication is truly impressive!

Madeline Fluckinger a Bennington College intern learned Past Perfect Software, and cataloged over eighty images within a multi-type photograph collection. .

Jeremy Frazier has continued to interview World War II veterans and their family members for documentation and the creation of a documentary. Nineteen veterans were interviewed in the 2023-2024 year and two interviews occurred in the 2024-2025 year.

Janice Fronko, a textile conservator, continued to apply her expertise while providing guidance and hands-on-helpfulness with the Nashua Historical Society's extensive Textile Collection. She has assumed all of the accessioning, cataloging, storage and care needs for all of the incoming textile donations. Janice has completed 199 catalog records.

Matt, a client and Laura Welper, an employee of The Plus Company, organized and prepared for cataloging numerous business receipts from Frank Mooney's business receipts collection. Matt and Laura have completed 57 catalog records.

Sarah Jauris, a former Collection Technician, has participated in different collection projects. She has cataloged 56 collection items. She has been the primary creator, researcher and installer of World War II Exhibit, titled "World War II in Nashua, The Home Front and Beyond".

Paula Lochhead is a textile expert who has continued to provide her expertise, guidance and assistance to the Historical Society's textile collection. She researched specific textiles within the Historical Society collection, created a textile lecture and presented this lecture, in coordination with an exhibit that included some of the Nashua Historical Society textiles.

Beth McCarthy, Curator, provided support and guidance to all of the individuals who worked/volunteered on the following Committees: Collection, Exhibit, and Research and Records Committees. Current accessioning practices and past accessioning maintenance along with furthering the preservation of numerous aspects of the Historical Society's eclectic collections were the Curators area of focus along with the maintenance of all of the collection support files.

Marie Smith learned how to catalogue using Past Perfect Software. She cataloged Nashua Centennial Parade photographs which included parade floats on Main Street.

Julie Sullivan learned how to catalogue using Past Perfect Software. She cataloged images for include Nashua people, reunions, parades, the 1936 flood and a visit by President Carter.

Technology Annual Report 2024 - 2025

The Society was awarded a grant of \$ 2,655.98 from the Saul O. Sidore Memorial Foundation for the purchase of 2 new computers and monitors. This equipment has been purchased and was installed by Barbara Bankeroff.

A business server was purchased so our network would run more efficiently. It was installed on our network by our network consultant. In addition, a backup drive and a Universal Power Supply (UPS) were added to the server.

Because four of the Society's existing computers were running slowly, they were upgraded with solid state drives and the RAM was increased from 8 gigabytes to 16 gigabytes. This work was done by our network consultant and these computers now run much faster. One of these upgraded computers has been added to the Library.

A water leak in the basement of the Abbott-Spalding House is directly over the electrical box and underneath that box are the internet and telephone equipment. As this leak most likely accounts for the sporadic internet outages the Society has been experiencing these past several months, this equipment will be replaced and moved to another location.

The museum software PastPerfect is used for processing artifacts and for membership. This database resides on the Server and is backed up several ways: online backup by IDrive, backup to a portable hard drive, and periodic backup to a flash drive. At this point, 12.0 gigabytes of PastPerfect data are backed up – an increase of 1.2 gigabytes since May 2024.

All files in the shared area on the Server are backed up online by IDrive and to a portable hard drive. At this point, 92.1 gigabytes of data in the shared area are backed up. The computer in the office is also on the backup schedule and has 24.6 gigabytes of data backed up.

PastPerfect records continue to be added to our online site. There are 159 records online including photographs from the Frank Ingalls Collection, Nashua Fires Collection, Wedding Attire Collection, Baby Clothes Collection, and photos of schools and bridges. These records can be accessed at nashuahistorical.pastperfectonline.com, and by using the link on both our Facebook page and our Web page. More records will be added over time.

Office Report 2024 - 2025

With 43 events, over 5,000 volunteer hours, and close to 300 memberships, the Nashua Historical Society is busy.

Two newsletters and a variety of program cards were sent out this year. Thank you to the efficient mailing committee for preparing these items and the annual election materials according to US postal bulk mailing criteria.

Our Gift store sales took off this year, especially just before the holidays. BAE donated a glass case for the front hall which looks great filled with Nashua Historical Society items.

Documents Retention and Shredding

As a new committee, we met in August 2024 to review guidelines per those policies adopted at the Board of Directors meeting of The Nashua Historical Society in April 2024 and of the NH Nonprofit Center regarding oversight and retention time periods by category. Through FY 2025, the committee will have met nine times, and thank you to Mary Foran for providing support and appreciation for this new committee.

Always mindful of “permanent” categories, we were able to relegate to shredding a lot of older material prior to FY 2014. To aid us further, Jeannine Levesque compiled a working chart of FY dates, as well as documenting what has been shredded. Labelling and “Destroy After....” dates will be incorporated. Happily, space in file cabinets has already been filled with more recent material.

Work continues with meetings and free shredding opportunities in 2025. In addition to Jeannine, thanks go out to Mary Kirkwood for her help, as well as to some other occasional members.

Property and Grounds 2024 - 2025

The Florence Hyde Speare Memorial Museum

The Speare Museum was built in the 1970's and as we all know as everything ages and maintenance becomes increasingly important.

This past year's area of focus was on planning for the installation of an exterior sprinkler system underneath the newly built roofs over the handicap roof and shed roof over all of the HVAC units. Plans for additional building improvements as always were discussed which included the possibility of some brick re-pointing or waterproofing as protection from the elements.

John L. Carter Sprinkler Company replaced a large section of corroded pipe which was located inside textile collection storage room of the Speare Museum.

As needed repairs were completed which included a new electrical element for one of the hot water heater was diagnosed and completed. Repairs to the humidity system for the Museum's furnace occurred, which prevented flooding. We added additional security camera coverage to the Speare Museum.

Seasonal flowers were added to many of the surrounding trees on the property and a new flower garden was planted in the back portion of the Historical Society's parking lot. Thank you to volunteer Susan Lavoie. Four apple trees were planted on the side lawn of Crescent Street through the guidance and the generosity of Nashua's Regenerative Roots. We anticipate that these tree's will soon be providing us with many apples. City of Nashua's Streets Department representatives dug the holes and provided mulch for these new apple trees.

Gate City Tree Services trimmed all of the trees on the Florence Museum's grounds and also donated mulch.

The Abbot-Spalding House Museum

The Historical Society's two hundred year plus Museum, experienced the replacement of numerous portions of rotten wood, this included many widow sills, the wooden areas surrounding the apartments Abbot Street side entrance and significant portions of wood around the front door entrance of the Museum located on Nashville Street.

Much needed fence repairs and wood replacement was completed by Roland Fisher. Roland Fisher installed a new garage keypad.

Emphasis was placed on understanding the rotten wood needs of the Abbot-Spalding House. Estimates were obtained as keeping the house museum in good condition is an ongoing effort.

Estimates were acquired to determine the water leaks source surrounding one of the chimneys of the Abbot-Spalding House. Admiralty Chimney was the company chosen to do the repair work needed on all of the Museum's chimneys. This chimney work has been scheduled for this upcoming summer. The ceilings of the two bedrooms which received water damage from this chimney leak will be replastered.

A home inspection of the Abbot-Spalding House was completed in late March by Tri-State Home Inspections from Bedford/Goffstown. This inspection was undertaken to assist with providing a guiding path as to what and how to prioritize the maintenance and repairs of the Museum. Work on a portion of the plumbing needs highlighted in this report has been undertaken and completed.

The Board of Directors formed a Historic Preservation Committee for the House Museum. This committee's goal is to understand, plan and oversee the preservation work of the Abbot-Spalding House.

The Nashua Garden Club provided the support and maintenance of a backside garden and the front garden of the Abbot-Spalding House.

Gate City Tree trimmed all of the trees on the grounds of the Abbot-Spalding House. This company donated a birch tree and delivered both the birch tree and a Historical Society purchased sugar maple tree. Both were planted in the backyard of the Abbot-Spalding House. City of Nashua Streets department representatives dug holes, supported the completion of the planting of both the new trees

Thank you to Bob and Margaret Garneau for the holiday decorations. The Abbot-Spalding holiday lights remained up longer this year in memory of Bob Garneau, Thank You Jeremy Frazier for assisting with packing up the holiday lights.

The Society's lawncare services were continued with St. Laurent for three-season lawn care. They coordinate with the company providing fertilization, Southern NH Lawn Care.

Education Committee 2024 - 2025

The Education Committee, although small in numbers has been mighty this year in efforts particularly in developing museum appeal for children.

Let's start with the new Scavenger Hunt for the Abbot-Spalding House. This latest version highlights the many eagle motifs that you may find throughout the home. It's a simple nod to the 250th anniversary that fits our museum so well. Progress was made on our Walking Tour of the Nashua Historical Society's Neighborhood download. We have the pictures ready to go thanks to Pam Anderson. We will be continuing this project this year.

The Committee was interested in the possibility of a Story Stroll (Walk) featuring children's books on our property. We looked into the project done at Beaver Brook and the cost. Paula Lochhead is working on a collaborative path forward.

On March 2, 2025, the Education Committee hosted The Little Red Tea. We welcomed 42 guests this year to our deep, dark woods for tea and merriment! Even a visiting wolf enjoyed the afternoon! Our presentations included a talk on the significance of the storybook "Little Red Riding Hood" to southern NH, guest questions on the history of the color red and a STEM experiment for the color of tea. This event's final total was over \$700 and 5 new memberships!

We are pleased to share with you that items are being selected for our New Discovery Boxes. These boxes for our young NHS History Detectives were donated as an Eagle Scout Project by Zachary Campbell of Troup 272 this spring. We have a few of the seven boxes made, here for your inspection tonight! We are still working on the right combinations of activities, but the goal is to have the History Detectives visiting us soon for hands-on adventure!

April 2, 2025 Beginner's Guide to Cemetery Sleuthing, guest speaker Erin Moulton, supported by a grant from the NH Humanities Speakers to Go!, 7:00 – 8:30pm. Refreshments.

The Committee was asked to support with ideas, people and organizing the Society's presents at two Nashua Fairs. The first, was the 2025 Nashua Sustainability Fair that took place on Saturday, April 26th. We presented a quilting project to show how fabric can be reused to support waste reduction and recycling.

The second event is coming up this week, the Greater Nashua Volunteer Fair on Thursday, May 22. This helps us to stir volunteer help and even membership at the Society.

Please watch for more information on this history adventures. The Keefe Scholarship application was put on line in the beginning of February. This form was revised this year. All high school seniors who reside in Nashua and have an interest in history were encourage to apply before April 28th. Tonight, I have the pleasure of announcing the winner of the Nashua Historical Society's Edmund M. Keefe Memorial Scholarship made possible by the bequest of Pat Thurber in honor of our Society's President, Dean Shalhoup specifically to the scholarship fund. Her thoughtfulness to the Society is most appreciated.

Zachary Campbell contacted the Society in hopes of finding a connection that would lead to his Eagle Project last year. In Zach's words, "I contacted the Nashua Historical Society with the hope of helping my community in a way that mattered to me personally. I have been deeply invested in learning about history. We worked together to develop the Society's vision of multiple hands-on areas for children that met the integrity of our museums. He knew it was a project that necessitated quality and attention to detail. Zach brought in building experts, lead a young labor force, and approached the greater Nashua community to achieve his goal. At final count, seven Discovery Boxes for the combined use in the Florence Speare Museum and the Abbot Spalding House were completed successfully. 
