And the Bride Wore...A Showcase of 150 Years of Nashua Bridal Fashion was the first exhibit opening that the Society held since the beginning of pandemic. Paula Lochhead and Janice Fronko curated the exhibit. The exhibit was very well received by the public.

The exhibit had a soft opening in August for members. It was then open to the public on September 10 and 11 and again on October 8 and 9, 2022. After being closed for the winter, the exhibit reopened on April 15 and 16, 2023. On April 15, Astrida Schaeffer of Schaeffer Arts spoke prior the exhibit opening. Her topic was how bridal fashion colors had changed over the years.

The exhibit will be open again in May and June.

Technology Committee Report Annual Meeting May 16, 2023

A tablet was purchased and SQUARE software loaded on it to allow visitors to purchase items using a credit card. The tablet was used for the Bridal Show held in the Fall of 2022 and the Spring of 2023.

A new computer and computer table were purchased for the Speare Library to provide better Zoom capability for Society meetings.

The remaining funds of the SHARP Grant from the New Hampshire Humanities (SHARP= Sustaining the Humanities through the American Rescue Plan) were used in the following ways:

- Our Zoom subscription was renewed when our current one expired.
- Eight film reels, 38 video tapes and five DVDs were converted to MP4 files so they can be added to our YouTube channel.

The museum software PastPerfect is used for processing artifacts and for membership. This database resides on the Server and is backed up several ways: online backup by Carbonite and a periodic manual backup to a portable hard drive, a flash drive, and a computer other than the Server. Also all files in a shared area on the Server are backed up in this fashion. This ensures that in case of a

catastrophic issue with the Server, our database will not be lost. At this point, a total of 33.9 gigabytes of data are backed up – 12.2 gigabytes of PastPerfect data and 21.7 gigabytes of data in the shared area. This is an increase of 1.2 gigabytes of PastPerfect data and 7.9 gigabytes of shared data on the Server since May 2022, the last reported increase.

The computer in the office has been added to the Carbonite backup schedule because it is the main computer for the Society and handles most of the email. As of this month, 17.5 gigabytes of data are backed up. This is an increase of 1.2 gigabytes of data since May 2022, the last reported increase.

We have continued to add records of our collection to our online site. At this point there are 127 records online, including photographs from the Frank Ingalls Collection, Nashua Fires Collection, Wedding Attire Collection, and Baby Clothes Collection. These can be accessed at nashuahistorical.pastperfectonline.com, and by using the link on both our Facebook page and our Web page. More records will be added over time.

Nashua Historical Society Annual Financial Report 2022-23

The Nashua Historical Society's finances continue on a sound footing in what has been, overall, a successful year despite inflation, volatile financial markets, and a number of unanticipated expenses at our buildings.

Our investments have continued to provide us with ample operating funds despite the market downturn of 2022, as the disbursements to us are based on the average of three-years' earnings. The great growth in our investments in 2020 and 2021 more than adequately made up for the lesser returns of calendar 2022, so that disbursements this past year, Fiscal Year 2023, were the highest in our history.

Our investment advisers, at a meeting during the winter, were somewhat split on their attitude toward the market and economy for the rest of this year, with our TD Bank rep showing more cautious optimism than the one for Bank of America. Neither, however, was completely negative, and both advised staying the course with our current mix of stock and bond holdings. Utilities have been and will continue to be our biggest expenditure affected by inflation, though our Capital Improvement projects and even maintenance have also been affected to a degree.

The Society experienced several water issues during the past year that necessitated unanticipated expenditures, most of which have already been addressed. Other difficulties have arisen, however, and we continue to address them in as timely a manner as possible. Also, the Capital Improvement projects to add roofs over the handicapped access ramp and over the HVAC system, both at the rear of the Florence Speare building, have not yet begun due to delays in plans, permitting, supply chains and inflation. Dennis Parker may have more to say about this in his Grounds and Buildings report.

At last year's annual meeting, I reported that the Society was the beneficiary of more than \$75,700 from the late Nashua High School history teacher Paul L. Tringoson. In accordance with the vote of the Board of Directors, these funds – with additional interest – have been added to the Stearns Endowment Trust held at TD Bank, from which we receive quarterly payments.

Annual report from Property Management committee for 2022-23

AS house

For the past two years we have been seeing the wood shutters deteriorate and lose their slats, Roland has been collecting and repairing the same. Along those lines Roland helped us out on the lock and handle on the basement door that needed repair. Big thanks to Roland.

Last fall we repaired the back window framing on apartment. This was a direct result of our landscape contractor hitting the window AC unit with ride on lawnmower. After several calls and follow-ups, the Landscaper finally reimbursed Society for all window damage and AC unit owned by Alice.

After the landscaper damage we decided to go out bid after four years with same company. Last fall we selected St. Laurent Landscape and snow plowing as our summer/winter vendor. We were pleased with the snow removal this winter and awarded the Landscape contract as well starting April 2023. The pricing on both contracts were similar to what we paid P&L and I negotiated weeding as part of normal work.

Museum

For the past two years we have been applying to the city for permits. This was for adding on the shed roof over the HVAC equipment, plus the Handicap roof over ramp on back door. Two years ago, Parkhurst Construction gave us a bid to do both for



approximately 42k but we needed a building permit. Once we started to work with the city building dept. we learned a second dept was involved because Museum is in the Historical district. I started the process and developed rough plans on both structures to present.

At the first historical meeting I was told we needed an architect for proper drawings and design had to fit in with existing bldg./ neighborhood.

I quickly spoke to a local architect and asked if he could do the drawings and keep the design cost down being a nonprofit. The design and plans took about four months, then we could go back to the committee and get approval. We got both dept.'s blessing last fall, got the drawings to Contractor and Parkhurst had two design changes and snow load on shed had to be increased. When new pricing came back to us with material increases, Covid factor and added changes the bid almost doubled.

We have decided to move forward with Handicapped roof over ramp and work will start next week. Parkhurst will tear down the existing roof over back door and extend the roof line. We are doing a time and material cost with contractor because we only have the 40 thousand approved.

Cupola Mystery Solved

The past several years we have experienced interior water damage on ceiling of central hallway to 2^{nd}

floor. Water would drip and stain the ceiling and then stop. We had 2-3 contractors examine the Cupola and even tried blocking open louvers on inside thinking it was wind driven rain. Last November I was in the parking lot after a rainstorm and looked up and saw water dripping from the spire above the Cupola.

December/January I contacted Viking roofing and told them our suspicions. I told them to secure 3-4 story lift and examine roof and fix the problem

story lift and examine roof and fix the problem while up there. They built a small copper cap to go over spire where it goes into the wood post and now water runs off.

Recently we replaced heating elements in hot water tank that services the two main bathrooms.

Projects and required maintenance for 2023-24

AS house

Painting and repairs to wood siding at from entrance including some columns

The four chimneys in dire need of restoration, one is causing leaks into two bedrooms on 2^{nd} floor

Paint stain kill ceiling in two bedrooms Fountain issue, Roland and Bob Garneau to investigate water usage and plumbing under ground

Back patio needs TLC with columns and supports

Gable end on Abbott St has wire barricade to prevent critters from entering, this spring while reviewing roof we noticed wire has been opened and bare wood is being chewed.

Minor damage to fencing on Abbott Street side, broken balusters from vandalism.

Museum

Elevator repairs – Sump pump/oil minder is malfunctioning, appears to be 30-year-old pump and check value is broken. Pump company out to check repair or

replacement. All work must be coordinated with Stanley elevator company to access pit. Involves our electrical to update/replace any wiring.

Construction to start on the Handicap ramp roof next week.

Crisp Contracting out to investigate water in basement below library. Two theories: First they will explore catch basin pipes from parking lot to Abbott St for any blockage. If no blockage or broken pipes they propose to re-grade south wall of Library with pitch away from building with water barrier beneath. (currently we have negative pitch back to building)

After finding leak on Cupola, photos from roofer displayed severe neglect of maintenance on wood structure. Scraping, caulking, priming and painting all four sides is needed ASAP.

Parking lot repairs: we have four large holes that need attention, and we are securing bids to repair with patchwork to extend life a few more years.
